3	CHI3001 方言與中國文化	徐剛教授	Language belongs to the category of culture. However, it is a very special kind of category. It may be the most direct, but, simultaneously, the most unconscious reflection of culture. Therefore, the most authentic reflection. This course is to study the Chinese culture through the Chinese language. The Chinese language owns the most abundant dialects in the world, which is complicated but very interesting. We will discuss many cultural phenomena, such as the spread of the Chinese culture, the migration of the Chinese people, the changing lifestyle, the contacts of dialects, etc., by studying the special linguistic phenomena of dialects. 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7	CLB9014 Food,Culture & Identity	Dr. TANG Kin Ling	<p>Not only is food vital for survival, it is also a substance that is important to the construction of cultures and identities. Indeed, whether it is the sense of robust unpretentiousness that is often associated with the American hamburger or the meticulous attentiveness of the kaiseki ryori 懷石料理, there are undeniable similarities behind the process of associating one type of food to a particular nationality and the imagination/construction of that national identity. The study of the gastronomical practices of one group of people, thus, provides a unique and an effective means to gain introspective insights into the forming of various cultural traditions as well as to facilitate the understanding of the process of the formation of cultural identity.</p> <p>By focusing on the various representations of food in both Chinese and Western cultures, in different mediums that include but are not limited to the literary and the visuals, this course challenges students to look beyond the idea of food as simply a nourishment and to consider the inherent relationship between food and cultural identity in both the Eastern and Western contexts and its translational importance as a means for facilitating cultural exchanges.</p>	English / Cantonese	Every Thursday 10:30-12:30	MBG01	5
8	ACT2201 Intermediate Accounting II	Prof. ZHANG Yue	<p>(Prerequisite: ACT2200 Intermediate Accounting I) This course is a continuation of Intermediate Accounting I. The course further develops the student's technical and problem-solving ability involved in the accounting process and the preparation and analysis of financial statements. 10	CCC8014 China in World History	Dr. CHEUNG Yin Ki	<p>This common core course focuses on China's political, economic and cultural interactions with the rest of the world from ancient times to the present, and the impact of such contacts on both China and the world. 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11	CLA9003 Innovation in Practice	Prof. PENG Ling	Innovation has become a major engine of economic expansion and social development. Understanding the dynamics of innovation and ability to plan and contribute to the strategic processes underlying innovation is therefore essential to job performance and personal career development in arts, economics and business. This course focuses on how to create value and growth through innovation in new and existing markets. Students will learn the skills of creativity and innovation and how to apply those skills across the entire innovation management continuum including opportunity identification and selection, concept generation and evaluation, development and launch. 12	CLD9003 Statistics in Modern Society	Mr. LAM Wing Lun	Wells, H.G., the celebrated English author and historian, noted more than 100 years ago that “statistical thinking will one day be as necessary for efficient citizenship as the ability to read.” Modern society is becoming so complex that there is an ever increasing need for citizens to possess an array of analytical skills. This course will help students develop skills in statistical thinking and reasoning through the use of real world examples from the fields of economics, business, psychology, sociology, and political science. For example, does daycare breed bullies? Is your lifestyle healthy? Who benefits from a tax cut? Are the rich getting richer? Are we smarter than our parents? This course will address such issues as these in order to illustrate ‘user friendly’ approaches to statistical studies. The course is specifically designed for non-statistical majors. 13	CLD9015 Understanding Evolution	Prof. FONG Jonathan	“Nothing in biology makes sense except in the light of evolution” (Dobzhansky, 1973) Biology is the study of living things, and includes a diverse range of topics such as genetics, physiology, and ecology—evolution is the theory that connects all subjects in biology. The goal of this course is to provide students with a working knowledge of evolutionary theory and use it to understand current issues (i.e. disease, climate change, and human behavior). The course will begin with lessons on the nature of science, followed by the history of evolutionary thought, key concepts of evolution, implications of evolution, and application to current issues. 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14	CLD9020 Artificial Intelligence and Society	Prof. MATTHIAS Andreas	This course provides an accessible introduction to the main methods of applied artificial intelligence as they are used in commonly available household products, care robots, self-driving cars, and automated weapons. After establishing some theoretical basis (theories of intelligence, methods of AI), it goes on to describe in detail the architecture of a number of easy, introductory AI systems (expert systems, computer game players, chat bots, and robotic pets), while also presenting these systems in the classroom and giving the students the opportunity to interact with them and (give sufficient interest and ability of the students) to make some easy modifications and adaptations. This hands-on approach is a unique feature of this course, and will give the students some actual experience in handling, analysing, and understanding the workings of basic AI systems. No previous programming knowledge is needed, but students should be open to learning basic concepts from computer science. All actual interaction with computers will be in form of guided exercises that do not require special skills. Finally, the course will address the social and ethical implications of autonomous machines, using examples such as household assistants, care robots, self-driving cars, and autonomous weapons. No prior programming experience is needed, but participants should have a basic familiarity with computers and an interest in information technology. 15	CLD9025 Climate Change & Human Health	Prof. WONG Pui Yun Paulina	This course provides an overview of issues related to climate change and human health in the context of public health. It introduces fundamental concepts of climate change and climate change related human health impacts. The course comprises a series of 3-hour lecture and discussion sessions, as well as field trips. Lectures will cover topics such as causes and consequences of climate change and scientific methods relating to climate change assessments and the challenges of sustainable development. The policy implication about different adaptation and mitigation strategies related to climate change and human health impacts will also be examined. Guest speakers of related disciplines will be invited to talk about future impacts of climate change and small-group field trips will be arranged. Other learning activities include movie appreciation, case studies, media reviews, data analyses, field trips and group discussions. Service-Learning will be implemented in the course. All students will undertake the Service-learning component. (Senior learners are welcome to participate in the Service-learning component as well.) 16	CLD9026 Food:Health,Tech&Environment	Prof. SUNG Yik Hei	Food is essential to life. The course aims to provide students a comprehensive overview of scientific principles and issues related to food production and consumption by combining knowledge from multiple disciplines, including food science, environmental sciences, public health and social science. Upon completion of the course, students should be able to critically discuss the concepts and apply the knowledge to make healthy and sustainable choices of food. 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17	CLD9027 Blue Planet	Dr. GENG Hongyan	This course provides students a basic understanding of the Earth and its four main components: the atmosphere, hydrosphere, lithosphere and biosphere. The course comprises a series of 3-hour lecture and discussion sessions. Field trips and/or museum visits will be arranged during week 5 to week 8. The lecture will begin with the introduction of the Earth System and the Earth. Topics include: Weather, Climate, El Nino, Global Warming; Groundwater Contamination, Eutrophication, Coastal System; Earth's Origin, Plate Tectonics, Volcanism, Earthquakes; Ecosystems, Evolution and Extinction. In addition, Human Interactions with the Earth will also be examined. Other learning activities include movie appreciation, case studies, media reviews, field trips, museum visits and group discussions. 18	CLE9024 Democracy versus Dictatorship	Prof. CHAN Che Po	Political systems in the world, broadly speaking, can be classified into either democracies or dictatorships. These two political systems have differing philosophical backups, different institutional and bureaucratic arrangements and divergent social, economic and cultural backgrounds which sustain their existence. This course examines the philosophical origins, institutional characteristics and relevant economic, social, cultural and political conditions sustaining and changing democracies and dictatorships. 19	ECO2101 Introduction to Economics	Prof. WHITTEN Gregory William	This course emphasizes the economic way of thinking. It introduces students to the basic principles of microeconomics and macroeconomics and shows them how economists study consumer behaviour, firm behaviour, and the performance of the whole economy. 20	HST2203 History of China in 20th Century	Prof. DU Chunmei	This course introduces students to the major trends in the history of China since 1900. 21	 MKT2241 International Business Management	Prof. WHITLA Andrew Paul	The International Business Management course builds on the students' existing knowledge base and assumes that students are familiar with the international environment of business. The course moves beyond the broad environment to the specific organisational context, examining how multinational enterprises organise and compete in the international arena. The course deals with structure and management of multinational corporations and the management of functional activities on an international basis. Further, from a strategic perspective, the course addresses the competitive challenges of doing business in differing geographic environments. 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22	MKT3301 e-Marketing	Prof. LI Yiwei	The use of Internet as a global communication medium has been the recent trend in the business. Internet has been treated as the channel for business communications and transactions, and has achieved stature equal to that of traditional print and broadcast media. The increasing prevalence of the Internet and the improving skills of marketers in using this new medium have made the Internet everywhere in the lives of both consumers and business. This course provides an introduction to topics in electronic marketing such as e-business model, mobile marketing, and social networking marketing. This course involves acquiring skills and knowledge of current e-business models and applying the e-business concept to develop strategies to enhance customer relationships, competitiveness, and profitability. 23	 SCI3004 Climate Change	Prof. FONG Jonathan	This course will introduce students to controversial issues related to climate change and allow students to apply their scientific literacy skills to better understand and communicate about the issue. 24	SOC2101 Introduction to Sociology	Prof. CHEN Hon Fai	This is an introductory course in Sociology, starting with an overview of the nature of the discipline, followed by a survey of various aspects of the structures and dynamics of social life. General and specific examples are used to illustrate how thinking sociologically adds to our knowledge of the world around us. 25	SOC3002 Family and Society	Dr. LAI Yuen Shan	Families play an important role in individual development, social organisation and social processes. This course introduces students to sociological approaches to the study of the family as institution, process and practice. The course also focuses on the use of relevant empirical data, research findings and the application of sociological concepts and theories to analyse issues relating to contemporary families in Hong Kong and elsewhere. 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26	SOC3203 Social Gerontology	Prof. AU YEUNG Tat Chor / Prof. CHIU Tuen Yi Jenny	This course introduces students to social gerontology and its concerns with the impact of human ageing on all aspects of society. Gerontology is a multi-disciplinary field which studies the interrelated biological, psychological and social aspects of human ageing. It examines contemporary social issues and policy aspects of ageing and to encourage students to think about, analyse and project the effects of population ageing on political, economic, social welfare, cultural and recreational policies. The course examines individual, family and socio-economic issues, measures of ageing and health (physical and mental), the environment, accommodation and older persons' quality of life. 27	VIS2105 Film Art & Storytelling	Prof. YEH Yueh Yu	This course covers film art and cinema's social and ideological effects. In the first two parts of the course, students will learn vocabularies and terms needed to appraise and analyze films. We refer to examples from different countries and styles, ranging from mainstream Hollywood to Asian and European cinemas, from fiction to non-fiction film. In the last part of course, the concept of "cinema" will be explored to acquaint students with other aspects of the medium, including its industrial practice and its roles in contemporary social life. Topics to be taught include: film elements and form; film industry; non-fiction; film and gender/sexuality; film and ideology.
