Working along the strategic marketing process, during which the process is divided into planning, implementation, and control phases, a basic marketing framework for developing a marketing strategy will be introduced to the students via such tools as the use of e-book and online assignments, in-class activities (case studies, in-class group discussions and presentations), and an individual written assignment (individual written works for developing a marketing plan for a chosen company) to integrate what the students have learnt in the class. The course emphasizes self-learning and gives students a holistic view of how marketing functions in an organization as a management philosophy and as an activity. 9	CCC8011 Critical Thinking: Analysis and Argumentation	Prof. MATTHIAS Andreas	The primary aim of this course is to teach first year students the basic but crucial skills of analysing problems, evaluating inferences, and presenting arguments for or against claims or decisions. Students will acquire these skills by learning about the basic concepts and methods of critical thinking, and by working through problem solving exercises requiring them to employ these concepts and methods. Students will further develop these skills by producing extended arguments defending what they take to be the correct responses to accessible but challenging real issues and problems. The course also aspires to instill in students an open and inquiring attitude, so that students are more willing to look for reasons for and against their views, and more willing to change their views in the face of evidence. Hence, it is hoped that students will develop a habit of reasoning carefully upon completion of this course. 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10	CCC8012 The Making of Hong Kong	Prof.WONG Wai Chung/Prof. KWOK Chi / Dr. LAI Yuen Shan	This inter-disciplinary course introduces students to essential facts and knowledge on the nature of society, politics and economy in contemporary Hong Kong. Students will be able to develop local as well as global perspectives on Hong Kong society, and will consider implications for future policy and practice from multiple perspectives. 11	CCC8014 China in World History	Dr. CHEUNG Yin Ki	This common core course focuses on China's political, economic and cultural interactions with the rest of the world from ancient times to the present, and the impact of such contacts on both China and the world. Through analyzing some important historical events and topics grouped under four major themes, the course will examine China's changing relations with the major regions of the world, China's contacts with the other parts of the world, the changing mutual perceptions of China and the rest of the world, and comparisons of Chinese practices and institutions and those of other regions. 12	CLA9003 Innovation in Practice	Prof. PENG Ling	Innovation has become a major engine of economic expansion and social development. Understanding the dynamics of innovation and ability to plan and contribute to the strategic processes underlying innovation is therefore essential to job performance and personal career development in arts, economics and business. This course focuses on how to create value and growth through innovation in new and existing markets. Students will learn the skills of creativity and innovation and how to apply those skills across the entire innovation management continuum including opportunity identification and selection, concept generation and evaluation, development and launch. 13	CLC9020 Law in Everyday Life	Dr. HAN Peng	Law affects our daily life, our rights, and our social, economic, political and emotional well-being. 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14	CLD9008 Life Science: The Way Life Works	Prof. FONG Jonathan Julio	This course gives a brief introduction to the Origin of Life and provides an understanding of the physical conditions that enable planet Earth to create and sustain life. A practical approach will be adopted to arouse the curiosity and interest of the students in the subject in order to stimulate critical scientific thinking. The course addresses the basic chemistry and biochemistry of vital components for the living cell. The course explains the role and functions of the various organs and organelles in plants and animals. It engages students in open discussion on the socio-cultural-religious impact of the theories of evolution, reproduction and bio-engineering. This courses selects certain important topics which have a great impact locally and with possible global consequences. The course instills literacy in bio-science by broadening the scope of the students' knowledge in biology and will enable students to address issues on life competently and with confidence. 15	CLD9015 Understanding Evolution	Prof. FONG Jonathan Julio	“Nothing in biology makes sense except in the light of evolution” (Dobzhansky, 1973) Biology is the study of living things, and includes a diverse range of topics such as genetics, physiology, and ecology—evolution is the theory that connects all subjects in 4 biology. The goal of this course is to provide students with a working knowledge of evolutionary theory and use it to understand current issues (i.e. disease, climate change, and human behavior). The course will begin with lessons on the nature of science, followed by the history of evolutionary thought, key concepts of evolution, implications of evolution, and application to current issues. 16	CLD9016 Music& the Science of Sound	Prof. IP Kim Ho	This course will examine the make-up of music from the perspective of sound production. It will address such questions as: How is sound created? How do our ears hear? How do musical instruments produce sound? Can all sound be music? How is music based on math and physics? How can we manipulate sounds and sound technologies to make new music? How can changing the mechanics of music affect our emotional reaction to it? In exploring these questions, students will create and test new music and music technologies, and investigate the properties of sound and music from a scientific perspective. 17	CLD9020 Artificial Intelligence and Society	Prof. MATTHIAS Andreas	This course provides an accessible introduction to the main methods of applied artificial intelligence as they are used in commonly available household products, care robots, self-driving cars, and automated weapons. After establishing some theoretical basis (theories of intelligence, methods of AI), it goes on to describe in detail the architecture of a number of easy, introductory AI systems (expert systems, computer game players, chat bots, and robotic pets), while also presenting these systems in the classroom and giving the students the opportunity to interact with them and (give sufficient interest and ability of the students) to make some easy modifications and adaptations. This hands-on approach is a unique feature of this course, and will give the students some actual experience in handling, analysing, and understanding the workings of basic AI systems. No previous programming knowledge is needed, but students should be open to learning basic concepts from computer science. All actual interaction with computers will be in form of guided exercises that do not require special skills. Finally, the course will address the social and ethical implications of autonomous machines, using examples such as household assistants, care robots, self- driving cars, and autonomous weapons. No prior programming experience is needed, but participants should have a basic familiarity with computers and an interest in information technology. 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18	CLD9025 Climate Change & Human Health	Prof. WONG Pui Yun Paulina	This course provides an overview of issues related to climate change and human health in the context of public health. It introduces fundamental concepts of climate change and climate change related human health impacts. The course comprises a series of 3-hour lecture and discussion sessions, as well as field trips. Lectures will cover topics such as causes and consequences of climate change and scientific methods relating to climate change assessments and the challenges of sustainable development. The policy implication about different adaptation and mitigation strategies related to climate change and human health impacts will also be examined. Guest speakers of related disciplines will be invited to talk about future impacts of climate change and small-group field trips will be arranged. Other learning activities include movie appreciation, case studies, media reviews, data analyses, field trips and group discussions. The course aims to provide students a comprehensive overview of scientific principles and issues related to food production and consumption by combining knowledge from multiple disciplines, including food science, environmental sciences, public health and social science. Upon completion of the course, students should be able to critically discuss the concepts and apply the knowledge to make healthy and sustainable choices of food. 20	CLE9024 Democracy versus Dictatorship	Prof. CHAN Che Po	Political systems in the world, broadly speaking, can be classified into either democracies or dictatorships. These two political systems have differing philosophical backups, different institutional and bureaucratic arrangements and divergent social, economic and cultural backgrounds which sustain their existence. This course examines the philosophical origins, institutional characteristics and relevant economic, social, cultural and political conditions sustaining and changing democracies and dictatorships. *If you apply for CLE9024 and GOV2101 simultaneously, you will be admitted to either course to the maximum. 21	ECO2101 Introduction to Economics	Prof. WHITTEN Gregory William	This course emphasizes the economic way of thinking. It introduces students to the basic principles of microeconomics and macroeconomics and shows them how economists study consumer behaviour, firm behaviour, and the performance of the whole economy. It also demonstrates how these principles can be used to analyse public policies and understand society.	English (Advanced proficiency in English is required)	Every Wednesday: 13:30 - 15:30	MBG07	5
22	GOV2101 Introduction to Political Science	Prof. CHAN Che Po	This course is a general survey of the field of political science. Students are not required to have any background in the discipline. It provides the foundation for future studies in the field. *If you apply for CLE9024 and GOV2101 simultaneously, you will be admitted to either course to the maximum. 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23	HST2203 History of China in 20th Century	Prof. DU Chunmei	This course introduces students to the major trends in the history of China since 1900. 24	MKT3301 e-Marketing	Prof. HE Dongjin	The use of Internet as a global communication medium has been the recent trend in the business. Internet has been treated as the channel for business communications and transactions, and has achieved stature equal to that of traditional print and broadcast media. The increasing prevalence of the Internet and the improving skills of marketers in using this new medium have made the Internet everywhere in the lives of both consumers and business. This course provides an introduction to topics in electronic marketing such as e- business model, mobile marketing, and social networking marketing. This course involves acquiring skills and knowledge of current e-business models and applying the e-business concept to develop strategies to enhance customer relationships, competitiveness, and profitability. 25	PHI1002 Introduction to Philosophy	Dr. ATKINSON Christopher John	This introduction to philosophy will cover a number of the central topics of philosophy. These include: the challenge of skepticism, the ontological argument for the existence of God, the problem of evil, free will, the relationship between the mind and body, and personal identity. * This course included lecture and student presentation/discussion. Students are strongly recommended to attend the classes for student presentation / discussion. 26	 PHI3105 Philosophy of Happiness	Prof. MATTHIAS Andreas	What is happiness? How can we live a happy life? These questions have troubled philosophers, writers, religious leaders and other wise men since ancient times. In this course we will examine philosophical answers to the problem of human happiness from various times and places in human history. Since ideas don't grow in the void, and thinkers also live embedded into human society, we will also try to see the connection between the historical and biographical context of the author and his or her theory of happiness, before we discuss the application of the various concepts to our own lives of today. In order to enhance the directness of the experience, the course will be based almost entirely on the discussion of original reading material from various times and places (in English translation). Therefore participants must be willing to read, think about, and discuss the (sometimes lengthy) materials in class, including one complete (but short) novel. Upon completion of this course, students should have acquired basic understanding of the major theories and research findings in various areas of psychology, and how these major psychological theories can be used to examine and explain human behaviours, emotion, cognition and mental health. 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28	SOC2101 Introduction to Sociology	Prof. CHIU Tuen Yi	This is an introductory course in Sociology, starting with an overview of the nature of the discipline, followed by a survey of various aspects of the structures and dynamics of social life. General and specific examples are used to illustrate how thinking sociologically adds to our knowledge of the world around us.	English (Advanced proficiency in English is required)	Friday: 13:30 - 15:29	MBG22	10
29	SOC3203 Social Gerontology	Dr. HUANG Shixin	This course introduces students to social gerontology and its concerns with the impact of human ageing on all aspects of society. Gerontology is a multi-disciplinary field which studies the interrelated biological, psychological and social aspects of human ageing. It examines contemporary social issues and policy aspects of ageing and to encourage students to think about, analyse and project the effects of population ageing on political, economic, social welfare, cultural and recreational policies. The course examines individual, family and socio-economic issues, measures of ageing and health (physical and mental), the environment, accommodation and older persons' quality of life.
